RADIO COMMS GUIDE - CHASE OFFICIALS

Communication Stations

Control - Race control

Start

Timing

Catch (usually answered by Control)

Chase

Sweep

Traffic control / Flaggers

Ranch road 1

Ranch road 2 (Badger Ranch)

Alternatively- All stations

Chase vehicle radio person to control communication

1. Start by identifying yourself and specify who you are trying to reach

Example: This is Chase vehicle for Bike x to Control, come in Control

2. Release the button and wait for the station to confirm they are available to listen

Example: This is Control, I read you Chase vehicle Bike X, come in

3. Hold down the button and transmit your message. Go for short and sweet

In the event of an incident, Control wants to know these things foremost:

- What is the incident? [bike stopped / crashed / off the course?]
- Is/are the rider(s) ok?
- Is an EMT / ambulance needed?
- Is the course clear for upcoming bikes?
- Is the bike off the course?
- Is the chase vehicle continuing down the course, or pulled over? (Note that the vehicle is expected to continue down the course to Catch once helpers have gotten out)
- Are the team members off the course?
- Is there debris on the course?
- Where on the course is the issue? (By which mile marker or station)

Tips and tricks to improve transmission quality:

Face the mountain - turn towards the mountain to the right (east) of the course, towards the repeater Move to the shoulder (only if road is closed - no upcoming traffic)

Wait for heavy traffic to pass before transmitting

Tips and tricks to improve communication clarity:

Hold down the transmission button, then start talking.

Note that the beginning sometimes gets lost (e.g. say Come in Control vs Control come in)

Use Roger or Copy that to acknowledge that you have received a message

Copy the message if it is very important to confirm that you have received it, or to relay to other stations Hold the radio close to your mouth

Speak slowly and clearly - don't yell

Repeat or acknowledge instructions if applicable

Ask for a relay if you can't reach the intended station

Hold your message until any active communication is finished

During heats: only control, start and timing communicate during heats, unless there is a very, very important message (ie. emergency). No weather reports, chit/chat, or other announcements.

Typical vernacular we use

Radio = transmitting device (walkie talkie)

Channel = transmission channel, i.e. different channels for race control, chase vehicles, traffic control

Dial = Knob on the device for changing the channel

Button = the button to press down when transmitting and release when listening for reply

Course = the road, specifically the section between start and catch

Bike = the racing vehicle

Rider(s) = the occupant(s) of the Bike

Team = the support team of the Bike

Chase vehicle = the car/truck following the Bike

Shoulder = the side of the road (off the paved roadway)

Catch = the area where the Bike is caught

Down the course - in direction of Catch (Northbound)

Up the course - in direction of Start (Southbound)

To the left/right of the course - from the perspective of start to catch

The bridge - just after Timing, there is a bridge across a usually empty riverbed

EMT - Emergency Medical Team (ambulance)

Opening / closing the road - traffic controllers allow vehicles to pass or stop between our Heats

The road is hot - we are NOT closed, there may be vehicles coming

The road is closed - traffic is stopped on both ends, traffic may still be moving towards each end

Sweep is rolling - the sweep car has left Catch behind the last southbound traffic, heading for Start

The course is clear - no more traffic on the road. Determined by the sweep car when arriving at Start and by control when the last northbound vehicle passes at Catch

Session - multiple planned heats, e.g. Monday A.M. Session

Heat - single heat within the session in which the Bikes start in the defined order

Run - single run (ride) of a bike within a heat

Launched - successful start

Did not start / failed to launch - unplanned drop out of a Bike

Scratch - announced drop out of a Bike

On the course - in transit between Start and Catch

Basic Codes

Affirmative = Yes

Negative = No

Copy = Message understood

Disregard = Ignore the previous message

Roger or Roger that = Message understood

What's your 20? = What's your location

Do you copy? = Can you hear me

Radio Check = Is my radio working

Loud and Clear = Your radio is working

Say Again or Go Again = Say your message again

Over = I'm done with my transmission, ready for your reply

Out = I'm done transmitting for now

10-4 = Transmission is received

Stand by = I have heard your call, will respond as soon as I can

Relay = I am repeating the transmission from another station
